- Choice of TWO essay style questions
- Students choose ONE essay question to complete
- Total marks: 25
- Allow 45 minutes for this section.

Section IV: Change in the Modern World – Apartheid in South Africa 1960-1994

- Short answer questions
- Short answer source-based questions
- Total marks: 25
- Allow 45 minutes for this section.
